Info Sheets are knowledge-builders for those with little prior knowledge on a topic and can be used as training resources. Info Sheets are located at the end of each section.



A **Tools** icon indicates that there is a tool included in the Resource Pack to help carry out an action specified in the guidance. Tools are located in a separate booklet in each kit.



A Capacity Development icon indicates details of training or other capacity-building materials that can be used to increase knowledge and skills on a topic.



A Resources icon links to relevant UNICEF or inter-agency resources to support action specified in the guidance.
