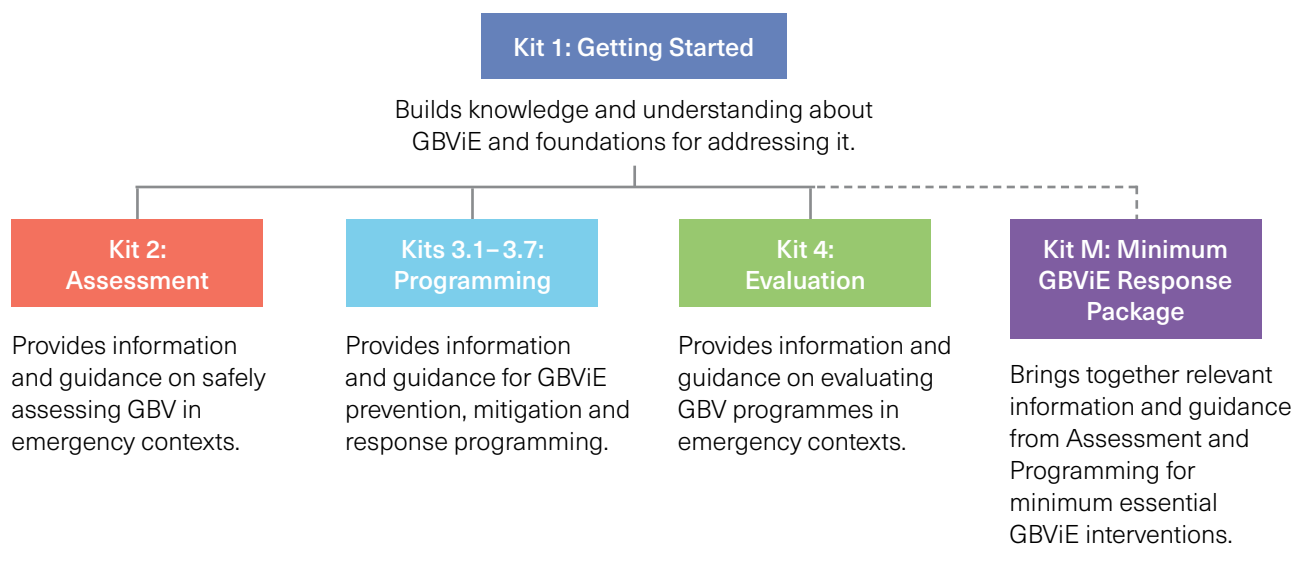


Resource Pack Overview



UNICEF's GBViE Programme Resource Pack provides resources, tools and technical guidance for GBV prevention and response in humanitarian settings. Throughout the Resource Pack, different symbols are used to direct readers to key resources, tools and other materials. The following key explains the different materials.

Each section includes a red **Snapshot Sheet**, located at the front of the Guidance Booklet. The Snapshot Sheet summarizes the section, overviews what's included and provides key messages for readers.



An **Info Sheets** icon indicates that additional information is available in the Resource Pack on a topic mentioned in the text. Info Sheets are knowledge-builders for those with little prior knowledge on a topic and can be used as training resources. Info Sheets are located at the end of each section.



A **Tools** icon indicates that there is a tool included in the Resource Pack to help carry out an action specified in the guidance. Tools are located in a separate booklet in each kit.



A **Capacity Development** icon indicates details of training or other capacity-building materials that can be used to increase knowledge and skills on a topic.



A **Resources** icon links to relevant UNICEF or inter-agency resources to support action specified in the guidance.

A **Case Study** icon highlights a box that contains information about an example from a UNICEF GBViE programme. Full versions of many case studies can be found in the *Case Studies Booklet* in **Kit 1: Getting Started**.
